All known places of residence, as well as places where vital events took place, are listed. Question mark indicates that data is uncertain.

Europe

WP = West Prussia (Royal Prussia, Poland, until Sept. 1772; city and rural territory of Danzig until 1793); counties listed are as of 1912, per Meyers gazetteer, with counties at the time of emigration, per 1808 revision list (Unruh, pp. 304-330) and Unruh (pp. 411-413), listed in parentheses, with slash between these sources, the first Amt being accurate for 1803-08 and the latter representing the Kreis at a later date

Gr. = Grosses

Mol. = Molotschna Colony, Taurida Province, although official boundaries shifted; Molotschna was originally in Ekaterinoslav Province

Chor = Chortitza Colony, Ekaterinoslav Province

Markusl = Markuslandt Colony, Ekaterinoslav Province

Bor = Borosenko Colony, Ekaterinoslav Province

Hamb = Hamburg/Altona, Germany

Neth = Spanish Netherlands (incl. Belgium); aft. independence (ca. 1581), the Netherlands (no Mennonites left in Belgium by 1600)

Ukr = Ukraine (then South Russia or New Russia), where all ancestral colonies in the Russian Empire were located

North American States or Provinces

Chi = Chihuahua, Mexico (near Cuauhtemoc)

KS = Kansas (Meade, Haskell and Finney Counties)

MB = Manitoba (all localities in, or on the boundary of, the Rural Municipality of Hanover, except Rosenhof, Rosenort (Scratching River) and McTavish in the Rural Municipality of Morris)

NE = Nebraska (all Jefferson County)

OK = Oklahoma (Garfield County)

SK = Saskatchewan (near Swift Current)

TX = Texas (in or near Taylor County)

bp = baptized (all adult baptisms, except Gilles/Mannen)

bur = buried

m = married (spouse or place of event)

Ellerwald III = 3rd Trift

Ellerwald IV = 4th Trift

Trift literally means pasture, but the reference is to straight east-west ditches or drainage canals leading into the Nogat River, along which settlements developed, with dikes which also served as roads. Each of the five Ellerwald villages now bears a different Polish name.

Notes:

(1) The numbers in front of each name represent the numbers on the pedigree chart of our grandchildren. Double the number represents the name of the father. Double the number, plus one, represents the name of the mother.

(2) The middle initial was always the first letter of the maiden name of the mother in the Mennonite Kleine Gemeinde (now the Evangelical Mennonite Conference), except where another person already had the same first name, same middle initial and same surname, which did not occur among my ancestors. I have included this initial for all those who lived after the Kleine Gemeinde was founded in 1812-15 (and even before then), where the mother's maiden name is known. I have done this even in the case of ancestors who did not belong, or may not have belonged, to the Kleine Gemeinde, at least in those cases where it might possibly be listed that way in records or publications pertaining to the Kleine Gemeinde.
